THE TOP ACADEMIC OHIO HIGH SCHOOLS

NOVEMBER 18, 2007 PREPARED BY SCOTT GERBER

As fall comes to a close, Ohio will be naming (or has named) its state high school champions in football, soccer, field hockey, tennis, cross country, volleyball, and golf. Congratulations to those schools for their fine accomplishments. However, while Ohio names its athletic champions, it has always seemed odd to me that Ohio does not name its champions in *academics*. After spending a considerable amount of time gathering data and analyzing it, I now have what I will call *my list* of state academic champions to share with you.

First, let me back up a bit. I have always been curious about which Ohio high schools had the best students but I did not know how to obtain that information. I thought that I would finally get this information when the Ohio Graduation Test (OGT) was introduced, but I found that the reports for individual schools were typically buried within the totals for the school district. This was especially the case for private schools. After consulting with several resources, I finally found a publicly available source for all individual school OGT data this fall.

What Was Included?

For those of you who are unfamiliar with the Ohio Graduation Test (OGT) results, there are results for five parts – Reading, Mathematics, Writing, Science, and Social Studies. There is also a summary page that shows the percentage of students who successfully passed all five parts with a "Proficient" rating. I used data from these five tests and from the summary.

There were 1,240 schools (with 147,359 10th grade students) in the analysis. Of those schools, 996 (with 146,451 students) had performance-related data. (Those schools with nine or less 10th graders included no performance information and are not included in the analysis.)

The March 2007 OGT was used as the source of the data.

Methodology Used

To get the initial group of schools to evaluate, the top schools were identified by using the percentage of students who scored "Proficient" on all five tests. To make my list of top schools, each school had to have at least 91% of their students pass all five tests. This yielded 59 schools (or 6%) out of 996. Congratulations to these schools. I then went back into the data and identified those schools which performed the best in each of the five subject tests.

The top schools in the initial list are as follows. This list is sorted by their proficiency percentage on all five tests and alphabetically where the proficiency percentage is the same for multiple schools.



To get a better understanding of how these schools performed versus all schools in Ohio, the graph below shows the percentage distribution of those students who passed all five tests. For example, 16 schools had no students who passed all five of the tests and seven schools' students recorded 100%. The 59 schools referenced above are indicated on the graph by the dark, maroon bars.

DISTRIBUTION OF PERFORMANCE OF ALL SCHOOLS



After getting this initial list of 59 schools, additional information on each of these schools was gathered. I obtained the schools' students' performance data for each of the five tests: Reading, Mathematics, Writing, Science, and Social Studies. With this data, I identified those schools' students who did exceptionally well by getting a large percentage of students in the "Advanced" category as well as in the "Accelerated and Above" category (which was created by adding the Accelerated and Advanced categories). For example, 96% the Columbus School for Girls' students achieved "Accelerated and Above", while 76% reached the "Advanced" category.

My List of State Academic Champions

I had planned to identify five schools in my list of the state's best but I felt that there was a natural break between these seven outstanding schools and the rest. Each school had extremely high Proficiency rankings on all five tests and each of them excelled in at least three of the five subject areas. (Please refer to the final pages of this document for the spreadsheet that includes detailed information on all of the 59 schools listed above.) Congratulations to the students, teachers, and administrators of these great schools.



Other Considerations


I also looked at three other items that may be of interest to you. I was surprised how large and small some of the Ohio high schools were. There were numerous schools which had just one student take the 10th grade OGT. I believe these are largely vocational schools. The largest school was Electric Classroom of Tomorrow and it had

1,143 students who took the test.

NUMBER OF STUDENTS PER SCHOOL




The performance of each group of schools based on size is listed in the graph below. There is not a big correlation (0.25) between the class size and a school's ability to do well on the OGT but I included the chart nevertheless. The graph is a bit confusing and somewhat hard to read. It includes both the number of schools in each size category (columns and left axis) and the performance of that category (data points and right axis). For example, there are 217 schools with ten to 49 students in 10th grade and 52% scored "proficient" in all five tests. The proficiency average for all of the schools that had performance-related data was 67%.



The number of boys and girls who went to single gender schools in each county are graphed below. Note that those schools which were identified as "youth services-related" schools are not included. Of the largest counties, Franklin County has the smallest percentage of single gender schools for its students. This is partly because the Columbus Diocese does not offer an all girls school.

Editorial

For those of you who have received my documents / analysis on a variety of subjects, you know what is coming next... At the end I typically offer my own editorial comments, and my views may differ from yours.

The OGT has been a terrific tool to identify the schools that need help but I do not think it has been sufficiently used as a way to recognize the best schools. That is the goal of this document.

Why did I not highlight the worst school districts and counties? This document is simply not about that. The sports pages do not identify the worst football teams in Ohio and this document will not do this for the schools which are not performing well academically.

Is the OGT a good idea? In my opinion, it the best innovation since the chalkboard was invented. I think it would be nearly impossible to run an effective school system without measuring results and carefully monitoring the yearly trends. For me, it would be like trying to evaluate a stock without the benefit of looking at any financial data. Personally, I want to see *real* results (good or bad) because I am paying *real* money for education.

Why is it important to parents to see a list of the best schools? Identifying the best school(s) for our children is one of the most important roles we have as parents and to not

have this type of comparative information is very unfortunate, especially when it is available for many of the (far less important) services and products that we purchase (via Angie's List, *Consumers Report*, and/or JD Powers).

Why is this important to the schools to do this? While it is fine for a school and its students to pursue a specific score (i.e. 93% Proficient on all five tests), it helps to know how your school measures up versus other schools in your area or league. A little competition has always been and will always be beneficial for all institutions and their customers.

Is there a better method to derive the academic state champions? I viewed each part of the OGT test as being equal to the others. Some may want to weight the Reading and Mathematics tests higher than others. Others would disagree with this.

Why did I not include extra-curricular activities into the equation for the top Ohio schools? Personally, I think the "extra-" activities already receive adequate attention. This document deals with what I think is most important – the academics.

Am I trying to make this a contest between private and public schools? No, I am not. There is no private / public distinction in Ohio sports and I do not see a reason to make a distinction in this document.

Has this type of document already been produced? I am not aware of one. The public schools compute a "Performance Index Score" and it can be used to rank the public high schools. I have not seen it computed for all of the private schools in the state.

Does this document include any mistakes? I hope not. I carefully entered the numbers and rechecked my work but it is possible. If I do this again, I would love to have a data feed which might increase the accuracy of the results. It would also make it faster and easier to create this document.

Will this type of ranking put more pressure on schools to do well? It might if the State of Ohio would endorse and publish the results of this type of competition. Personally, I think it would encourage all schools and their students to do better as they strive to be one of the best schools. However, I do not see this as applying pressure to *just* the high schools. I am not in the education business but it is my guess that you cannot have excellent performance on this 10th Grade test without the following:

- hard-working students who are willing to spend multiple hours on homework every night and who are challenging and competing against their fellow classmates.
 (And remember, unlike sporting events, every student in the 10th grade participates and every student matters.)
- caring parents who are giving their students an opportunity to work on their assignments and making the financial sacrifices to help pay for school either by tuition or by paying property taxes (or both)
- outstanding teachers who teach well and who can motivate their students
- administrations who set high expectations for the students, teachers, and parents
- outstanding elementary and middle school teachers who have established a solid foundation for the students

- active volunteers who help with those activities that the teacher / administrative staff do not have the expertise and/or time to perform
- supporting communities that place a high value on education

Will this type of ranking force schools to spend more time emphasizing the process of test taking? I understand that some schools spend an inordinate amount of time teaching their students to take this test. I would imagine that the above schools also prepare for the OGT, but I would bet that they cover the fundamentals so thoroughly that the OGT is a minor distraction for them – not a major emphasis. There are also some schools which appear to have substantially better approaches than others to teach some subjects, such as Summit Country Day with Writing, Columbus School for Girls with Reading, and St. Charles with Science. Not to put these schools or the other top schools on the spot but perhaps they would be willing to share some of their best practices with other schools?
